God gives us sufficient grace to handle our problems when we trust in Him. The words of Job (Job 23:12) "I have not departed from the commandment of His lips; I have treasured in my bosom the words of His mouth" provide us the assurance that God always keeps His promise when we rely on Him. Prayer and surrender are two important aspects in our relationship with God. Love is the essence of God's character. The Bible says (1 John 4:8) "God is Love" not God has love! And this is our assurance.

Two powerful channels of prayer given to us by the Church are the Rosary and the Eucharistic Adoration. When we pray the Rosary, we invoke the assistance of our Beloved Mother, Mary, to intercede with God for us. 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THIS IS OUR FAITH: ROLE OF THE LAITY

Now that Daniel has learnt more about the Catholic faith, he is disappointed to see that his excitement is not shared by his Catholic brethren...

Daniel: I must thank you Theo, for having cleared so many of my doubts regarding our faith. I am now truly beginning to understand the depth of Catholicism.

Theo: Oh yes, Dan, Catholicism is such a treasure! If only we experience a fraction of this beautiful jewel that we have inherited from our forefathers, we will be a much more vibrant community.

Daniel: But why is it that the world over, especially in developed nations and major cities of any country, the number of people dropping out of church is growing at an alarming rate?

Theo: That's a pertinent point that you are making, Daniel. The answer is not a simple and short one; but I will try to start answering that question with one word — 'Disengaged'.

Daniel: Disengaged!!?

Theo: Yes. Most of us are either thoroughly disengaged or at best partially interested. Some come because they have vested interests, which are other than spiritual. The reasons are many.

Daniel: I agree. If only the priests and religious...

Theo: (Interrupting) No Daniel, before you even start going that way, let me stop you right there. It's very easy to put the blame on the priests and the religious. Let's first know the role which our Church has assigned to us. The Church clearly teaches in the Catechism that "Lay believers are in the front line of Church life; for them the Church is the animating principle of human society. Therefore, they in particular, ought to have an ever-clearer consciousness not only of belonging to the Church, but of being the Church...they are the Church." (CCC-899). But let me tell you, while being a lay catholic comes with certain rights, it also comes with certain responsibilities. "The faithful should distinguish carefully between the rights and the duties which they have, as belonging to the Church..." (CCC-912)

Daniel: I did not know that the Church accords such a privileged position to us. But surely, you don't mean

that the priests and religious are not to be blamed for the precarious situation that we are in?

Theo: I am not saying that Priests do not make mistakes. But let me ask you a counter question. Where do these priests come from? They don't fall from heaven, do they? They come from our homes, Daniel! From our families! Families are the birth place of future priests. Not seminaries.

Daniel: Hmmm. You've got me thinking...again.

Theo: And that's another sign of disengagement. We want our priests and nuns to be spiritual, holy and perfect, in all senses of the word; but we want our children to become only engineers, doctors and MBAs. In today's world, how many of us parents, encourage our children to discern their call to religious life? And how many of us would jump for joy, if our children felt a calling to be priests or nuns or even lay missionaries?

Daniel: That's true! If I had realized it earlier, I would have been more active in Church. But there is so much politics everywhere. I just can't stand it.

Theo: What you call 'politics' is nothing but the way people behave everywhere. None of us is perfect. We are all broken people. But that cannot be the reason to not get involved. If you feel there is something wrong or something which can be done better, get in and be part of the solution, instead of complaining and judging. We should feel privileged and honored to serve the Church, which should be considered an extension of our home and not just a place where we are 'obligated' to go every Sunday.

Daniel: So, where do I start?

Theo: Oh, there are many ways we can help. But let me advise you: the primary motivation to get involved in church activities should be TO SERVE. There are so many initiatives which our church undertakes; so many associations, spiritual as well as charitable. Send your children for catechism, volunteer to teach catechism, sing in the choir, be an usher, become a lector... For starters, Parish Community Week is coming along. Ensure that you and your family participate in it fully. Move! Get started! Get involved!!
