

Christopher White took over in the next session, during which he beautifully explained the deeper meaning of the Book of Psalms. He also ensured that everyone remained active and energized by getting us on our feet to sing and dance and praise God.

The other speakers that night were Mr. Christopher Correa and Mr. Mark Braganza. The lively music and singing by Sharon Chang and her dedicated choir made the Night Vigil even more meaningful. The St. Patrick's Youth then conducted the Stations of the Cross around the Church campus. The Vigil concluded with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist by Fr. Bala Francis.

#### **OUR LADY OF FATIMA**



This year the Church celebrates the Centenary of the Apparitions of the Virgin Mary at Fatima, Portugal. Over the years 1916 and 1917, three shepherd children, Lucia Santos, Francisco and Jacinta Marto were witnesses to a series of apparitions of the Mother of God and

the Guardian Angel of Portugal. The children received three apparitions of the Guardian Angel of Portugal in 1917. He taught them to make short prayers and exhorted them to frequently receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion and offer prayers and penances for the conversion of sinners. Eight months after the third apparition, the children received an apparition of the Virgin Mary at Cova da Iria on May 13th, 1917. She appeared to them there six times between 13th May and 13th October 1917. The apparitions concluded with the spectacular 'Miracle of the Sun', witnessed by thousands of curious people who had gathered there, including photographers and journalists. During these apparitions, she spoke mostly of the importance of prayer and penance and emphasized that mankind should return to God. She also entrusted to the children three 'secrets', which were revealed in due course of time, in accordance with Mary's directions. These extraordinary events which occurred at Fatima were a call to the human race to forsake sin and actively turn to God with true repentance. Our Lady also exhorted the children to pray the Rosary and introduced herself to them as 'the Lady of the Rosary'. Francisco and Jacinta Marto died two years later, and were subsequently beatified by the Church. The eldest of the three, Lucia Santos, by then a Carmelite nun, died in February 2005 at the age of 97. In 1930, the Catholic Church recognised the Fatima apparitions as 'worthy of belief'. The Sanctuary of Our Lady of Fatima was built over the spot of the apparitions and today it is visited by thousands of pilgrims every year. This year, to celebrate the centenary of the apparitions, the Holy Father Pope Francis will visit the Sanctuary on that day and celebrate

Mass, during which he will canonise Bl. Francisco and Jacinta Marto. The celebration of this Jubilee is a great opportunity for us to heed the call of Our Lady, by turning to God and growing in our love for God and our heavenly Mother.
