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CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS OF DAUGHTERS OF ST. PAUL

We rejoice with The Daughters of St. Paul (Marian Zone) who celebrated the Centenary of their foundation, on 29th September this year. The religious order was founded by Bl. James Alberione in the year 1915 in Alba, Italy with the unique Mission of bringing the Gospel to the masses through the Communication Media.

The grand celebration began with a Thanksgiving Mass at the Jesuit Nivas Chapel, concelebrated by over 35 priests among whom were our parish clergy, with the Archbishop of Bangalore as the main celebrant. It was indeed a joy to see so many priests walk to the Altar! It was a beautiful and very uplifting service.

A program of felicitation, speeches and the Souvenir release followed at the St. Joseph's Auditorium, along with some light entertainment and a video presentation of the work done by the congregation over the years. The Sister Disciples of the Divine Master (which is a part of the Pauline Family) and some lay persons belonging to the Association of Pauline Cooperators were also an active part of the planning and festivities.

Archbishop Bernard Moras addressed the audience. In his address, His Grace congratulated the sisters for their good work, especially with regard to the Catholic Enquiry Centre in Viveknagar. He recalled the time he had worked with them in different roles throughout his Ministry. He also expressed his desire to have every institution in the Diocese become a place of CATHOLIC ENQUIRY.

The new liturgical year starts on Nov 29th with the First Sunday of Advent. Those who wish to follow daily Mass readings should refer to Year C for Sundays and Year II for week days.

We are grateful to God for blessing our parish with this congregation of sisters and for the help they render to the parish. We also pray that they may be blessed with a more fruitful second century of Ministry!

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My WOW Journey to see the Pope!

Serrans Worldwide rejoiced because our prayers were answered! Our patron, **Junipero Serra** was to be canonized! We came together on September 23rd in Washington, from all over the world, to celebrate the canonization.

The excitement began when Serra International was informed that the Vatican would allocate special tickets to the Serrans to attend the canonization Mass. Since I was going to be in Toronto for the summer, I immediately emailed Serra International to reserve 2 tickets for me. However, we did not receive any news from the Vatican until 10 days before the event. Uncertainty and excitement, at the same time, kept building up and Serra International was inundated with emails asking Yes? No? And then, just a week before the canonization, I got an email from our Executive Director to say that we were allotted a limited number of tickets, so lots would have to be drawn and the lucky ones would be informed. More suspense!

The wait was unbearable; but 2 days later I got another email to say my name was the first one to be drawn! Would I attend? I could not contain my excitement. Of course I would attend! How could I not? This was a-once-in-a-lifetime opportunity!

The excitement of the Pope's visit had filtered through—even to the U.S. immigration counter in Toronto! "You are going to be in Washington when the Pope will be there? You have a ticket for the canonization Mass? Wow, you are so lucky! How I wish I was going too!!" These were the comments I received while I sailed through the U.S. immigration and customs.

The scene in Washington was unbelievable. They had never seen so many people at one time, who had come just to be in the same city as the Pope, in the hope of getting even a glimpse of him. There were thousands of excited people. Wherever we went, the buzz was "The Pope is coming, the Pope is coming".

We had to wait in line outdoors, for 2 hours, to clear security but the time flew - people chatting, sharing experiences from where they had come, lay people, priests, seminarians, women religious, all waiting to get through security, some singing, some chanting "Viva Papa". Even the weather joined in the celebration as it was such a beautiful warm and sunny day in contrast to the previous day which was rainy.

Amidst all this chatter, suddenly the bells of the Basilica began chiming loudly and continuously, announcing that our Holy Father was arriving. We were still in the security line and the crowd began chanting excitedly "Viva Papa" and screaming with excitement, waving their flags, craning their necks to get a glimpse of him as he passed by. Just a glimpse seemed enough. To be present at the Mass was unbelievable. We were finally seated barely 5 minutes before the Holy Mass began.

The singing was out of this world. Mass was celebrated partly in Latin, Spanish and English and each person was given a kit with the Mass booklet in three languages and pictures of St. Junipero Serra, and believe it or not, a rain poncho. We were seated with people from different parts of the world, each one answering the responses in their own language. The Serrans alone had come from across the U.S. and from 10 other countries.

Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, looked his cheerful self and delighted the crowd by making his entrance to the grounds in the Popemobile. What joy for this massive congregation of 24,000 lay people, 3,000 seminarians all in their clericals, Cardinals and Bishops looking most resplendent, Priests and Religious in their colours. It was all so magnificent. The Mass was celebrated outdoors, on the east portico of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, the largest Roman Catholic Church in the U.S. and one of the 10 largest in the world. It lasted about 1-1/2 hours, ending with the Archbishop of Washington thanking His Holiness on behalf of everyone.

The Eucharistic celebration was over, and it left us with a happy, joyful and unforgettable spiritual experience. It took us nearly 2 hours to get back to our hotel, yet we were in the mood to celebrate the Sainthood of our patron Junipero Serra and our encounter with our Holy Father! 240 exuberant Serrans and guests celebrated with a sumptuous banquet that lasted nearly 3 hours.

Serrans around the world also celebrated - each Club in their own way, in their parishes. In Bangalore the Serrans offered Thanksgiving Masses in several parishes across our Archdiocese on September 23, 2015 and came together to watch the entire proceedings on TV.

WORLD PEACE DAY

World Peace Day, observed on September 21st of every year, is dedicated to world peace and specifically to the absence of war and violence.

In order to mark the importance of universal peace, we at St. Patricks Church celebrated "World Peace Day" on the 27th of September. The children and the faithformators were dressed in white to commemorate the occasion. In his homily, the deacon gave a meaningful message on how to maintain peace within oneself and with each other. Symbolic offerings were made during the 8.30am Children's Mass. An image of a frowning face - to signify the choice of love, compassion and forgiveness over anger, resentment, revenge and hatred; a wall clock - to represent our availability to God, to the needy and to oneself; pictures of a horse and a donkey - to signify how Jesus chose a donkey over a horse to show that He is the "Prince of Peace" and not a "Warrior"; a globe - to represent our world torn apart by violence and hatred. Bread and wine were offered with a prayer to transform each one of us to have a larger heart to embrace one another in spite of our differences and to maintain peace.

After the Mass, the parish priest along with the congregation set free a dove and some balloons outside the church.
